I spent my Christmas day partly with the landlady of the house I was renting. An American family invited me to their residence in Pasadena, California to spend the rest of my Christmas day. I still missed my parents despite having such a wonderful Christmas away from home.

My first Christmas in the US was spent in my Uncle's apartment in 1971. My then 71-year old Uncle had been here since he was 17 years old (old timer) so he had been used to the American way of celebrating Christmas, and he wanted to show it to us.

When we arrived in his apartment for the Christmas dinner, everything had been prepared. He set up the table like he was serving a formal dinner, complete with all the table accessories. Christmas music was being played on his stereo. He prepared roast turkey, baked ham and all the trimmings, like mashed potato, yam, cranberry sauce, pumpkin pie, apple pie, etc. I had mentioned to him before that I did not like turkey because I just was not used to eating turkey, so he baked a Cornish hen for me. I felt so special because he went out of his way to cook something else for me. It was a very good dinner not only for the food but because my parents were also present, so with all the members of my family.

After dinner, we received presents from my uncle, nicely wrapped like we have never seen before. We were all so happy, specially my children who were only 3 1/2 and 2 years old at that time.

My First Christmas Down Under By Mely Bonco

In Australia, autumn is from March to May, winter is from June to August, banned here with a fine to those who go against the regulation. Right after the midnight mass, we went home to eat our traditional "spring is from September to November, and summer is from December to February. I arrived in Sydney in the month of May, 1986.

In October all the shopping malls/centers started putting up beautiful Christmas decorations- a familiar sight back home. When December came, the weather became so unbearably hot-unlike weather Pinoy when it starts getting a little bit cooler, even colder by February.

On Christmas Eve, I didn't hear church bells ring, the sound of a single firecracker or see a bonfire at the middle of the street. These were totally Noche Buena", the usual ham, "queso de bola", spaghett, hot "pan de sal", hot chocolate (a concoction of native chocolate with peanuts from Batangas). After thanksgiving prayers, hugs and kisses to everyone in the family, we went to bed.

The next day, we visited the Contemplacions and a few circle of close relatives and friends who kept in touch with us through the years. We looked to this get-together with everyone bringing his own Filipino recipe (commonly called "potluck" or BYO-Bring Your Own plate to share). We wrapped Christmas presents (not more than \$5) for the exchange gifts-"palabunutan" style; and enjoyed singing our own Christmas carols with the accompaniment of a guitar, piano or the "karaoke-minus one".
